- 1. American culture and a corrupted heart have led us to a rejection of all authority. However, within God's ordained authority, God means for "good things to run wild!" How do we see authority as a means of God's grace to us? How can holding this perspective help us live in obedience to our earthly fathers?
- 2. The obedience of Children is commanded in this passage. However, authority can be abused. When should a wife, child, or employee not obey the command of authority? Can you justify your view by providing scripture?
- 3. Obedience has a time limit defined by the word "children." Honor has no time limit. Many adults have left the home and do not consider their father or mother "worthy of honor." How do we give honor to someone undeserving of honor? Have you ever had to do this?
- **4.** How important is the father's role in discipleship? How could you graciously encourage a father who neglects his role? How will you minister seek to minister to a young man or woman who does not have a father?
